From Monday afternoon, we would like parents to park on the left handside of the drive (the community garden side and not the cherry tree side). The first car will need to park up where the windbreak ends.


We are hoping that this means the turning circle will be completely free of parked cars, to make it easier and safer for parents to drive. Please ask relatives who drop off to do this too.

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Senior Learning

Maths – We have focused on finding 10%, 25% and 50% of a number. This gave the children the opportunity to practice multiplication and division. We definitely have some budding mathematicians.

Writing – We have started to focus on report writing. We will apply what we are learning to write a report on Samoa. We continue to review editing, adding adverbs and adjectives to our writing and using COPS to check our writing.



Reading – We have been reading two types of books this week. The first is for information about the ocean and coral and the second is purely for enjoyment. The class have been able to select chapter books and enjoy reading. Favourites in our class



is The Wolf Girl series, Diary of a Wimpy Kid series and Captain Underpants.

Topic – To bring our Samoan Island to a close, we tried coconut in many different ways. We tried coconut water, milk and cream. We then cracked open a coconut and ate the white flesh. Most of us prefer the coconut from the shell instead of the

dried coconut. We also baked a coconut cake, made coconut biscuit and made Pani Popo which is coconut buns. We also tried taro in coconut cream which is a staple vegetable in Samoa.

The seniors are taking on more responsibility by issuing PE equipment during morning tea and lunch breaks. This is to ensure equipment is taken care of and put away properly at the end of the breaks. There are two seniors on a day and they are doing a really good job.

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In maths this week we have continued to learn about directions. Giving directions or instructions is really key to mathematical thinking, logical and organised thinking and coding. This week we have written coded instructions for our beebots and then tried them out and refined them. We have been learning about grid references, and how to read a key on a map. We also introduced the concept of "North, East, South, West" and how to give directions using these (e.g. "go two steps north").

We have been using a map of the Big Island of Hawai'l to learn about these concepts.


In literacy we have been looking at a book called, "Is it a fish?" This book looks at different sea creatures and classifies them by different body parts. For

example, a whale lives in the sea

but doesn't lay eggs or have gills, so it's not a fish. We also made videos (in twos and threes) about what we know about sharks. There is a lot of specialist information in our class!

We have been writing recounts about what we have been doing. In phonics we were introduced to r-controlled vowels (e.g. ar as in car, ir as in first, er as in summer and ur as in curl). Although the children have been aware of these digraphs, we have started a deeper dive into them. In topic we have been looking at classification. We have found out the features of a mammal, fish and mollusc.
